OJJDP and MacArthur Foundation Collaborate to Provide Mental Health Training to Juvenile Justice Systems Across the Nation

The MacArthur Foundation has announced a partnership with the Office of Juvenile Justice and Delinquency Prevention (OJJDP) in a new training initiative designed to create sustainable mental health training capacity within state and local juvenile justice systems. Ten sites were competitively selected for this initiative: Alaska, Maricopa County, Arizona, Delaware, Florida, Georgia, Idaho, New Mexico, New York City, North Carolina and Tennessee.

Using a Train the Trainer model, the National Center for Mental Health and Juvenile Justice will train juvenile detention and residential trainers using the Mental Health Training Curriculum for Juvenile Justice (MHTC-JJ) - a new training tool developed by the Mental Health/Juvenile Justice Action Network.

The curriculum provides staff with basic information about adolescent development, mental health disorders common among youth in the juvenile justice system and practical strategies for supervising youth with mental health needs.

An evaluation component will evaluate not only the Train the Trainer but follow-up trainings that the selected sites convene over the next year. Trainings are expected to begin in the fall of 2012 and run through 2013. It is anticipated that close to 5000 juvenile justice staff will be trained on the MHTC-JJ as a result of this effort.

Office of Economic and Demographic Research Releases Economic Overview of Florida

A report released this month by the Office of Economic and Demographic Research (EDR) shows that Florida's overall economy is starting to slowly recover, but state economists added that it will take a few more years to climb completely out of the hole left by the recession. Other highlights of the report include:

- Foreclosures in Florida are up 23 percent for the first six months of 2012 over the previous year, the fifth-highest foreclosure rate in the nation.
- Florida's unemployment rate would stand at 9.5 percent - higher than the latest snapshot of 8.6 percent - if not for a huge drop in the labor force, primarily by Floridians who have exhausted their unemployment benefits and are no longer looking for work.
- Existing home prices are rising and building permit activity is on the rise, but existing home sales are "sputtering."
- Population growth is forecast to be relatively flat and is expected to average less than 1 percent between 2011 and 2014.
- Florida's personal income grew 0.7 percent in the first quarter of 2012, ranking the state 38th in the nation.

Economists believe that the economy will continue to improve with help from lower home prices that may attract buyers as the state's population starts growing again as baby boomers begin to retire.

Administrative Law Judge Rules Against DJJ on Detention Costs

An administrative law judge has ruled that Florida DJJ is illegally shifting millions of dollars in juvenile detention costs to the state's 67 counties. The Department of Juvenile Justice is reviewing the decision and has not yet decided whether to appeal.

Judge W. David Watkins sided with Nassau, Okaloosa, Bay and Pinellas counties. The case evolved around how DJJ interpreted a state law that requires counties to pay detention costs before court "disposition" of juveniles' cases. DJJ has interpreted the requirement to mean counties are responsible for the costs until juveniles are committed to state detention facilities.

DJJ Begins Process to Review Juvenile Justice Statutes

Secretary Wansley Walters recently hosted a series of calls to introduce the process that the department will institute for the review of Chapter 985, juvenile justice statutes. Online feedback is being received to be rolled up for review by a yet to be named oversight group. FJJA will be making formal presentations to DJJ. More information coming soon.

Governor Scott Appoints Sixteen to Juvenile Justice State Advisory Group

Governor Scott has appointed sixteen citizens to the Juvenile Justice and Delinquency Prevention State Advisory Group. This group represents a panel of people from across Florida with training, experience, or special knowledge of the juvenile justice system.

Working with DJJ, SAG members are responsible for the administration and management of federal money allocated for delinquency prevention research, planning, programming and evaluation, according to the Department of Juvenile Justice website. *Congratulations to FJJA member Kristen Early, of Justice Research Center for her appointment.*

DJJ Conducting Online Transitional Services Survey

Over the coming weeks, DJJ will be surveying providers, stakeholders and communities to get feedback which DJJ hopes to utilize in the identification of necessary support services to probationary youth and their families.

State Juvenile Justice Agencies Brace Themselves for Budget Reductions on the Federal Level

State juvenile justice agencies continue to be concerned about Congress's proposed levels of funding for delinquency prevention programming. According to the Coalition for Juvenile Justice, since 2002, Title II funding has been slashed by more than 50% from (\$88.8M to \$40M.)

Advocates fear that if federal funds shrink any further, states will have little incentive to meet federal guidelines for keeping juveniles from penetrating the adult prison system.

National Institute of Justice: *One Third of Americans Arrested by Age 23*

As the Florida DJJ begins a comprehensive review of the juvenile justice statutes, with a focus on juvenile records/confidentiality, a new study shows that nearly one-third of American adults have been arrested by age 23. Among the nearly 14 million arrests recorded in 2009, only 4% were considered among the most serious violent crimes (which include murder, rape, robbery, and aggravated assault). Another 10% of all arrests were for simple assault; these do not involve a weapon or aggravated injury but often include domestic violence and intimate partner violence. The remainder of the arrests in 2009 were for: property crimes, which accounted for 18% of arrests; drug offenses, which accounted for 12% of arrests; and other offenses including disorderly conduct, loitering, driving under the influence, and weapons violations, which accounted for 56% of all arrests.
