FJJA Develops 2011-2012 Legislative Agenda

FJJA Board members spent three days reviewing activities and accomplishments, identifying priorities going forward and charting the direction for this coming year. With legislative session beginning two months earlier than usual due to redistricting, FJJA members finalized the 2011-2012 Legislative Agenda and identified activities to support our priorities.

FJJA Activities to Support Efforts

1. Provide FJJA response for DJJ LBR consideration.
2. Appoint Legislative chairs and FJJA experts on specific issues.
3. Develop FJJA communication strategy to include talking points, briefing packets, key messages, data analysis, for FJJA members & lobbyists.
4. Organize local FJJA/FJJA Member local legislative events.
5. Schedule "FJJA Day" in Tallahassee to coincide with Children's Week/DJJ Youth Success Day during 2012 Legislative Session.
6. Establish workgroups to monitor issues and report back to FJJA members to include Medicaid reform, residential bed reductions, serving misdemeanants in the community, and others.

Department of Juvenile Justice Presents Year End Report and Upcoming Priorities at Retreat

Current Agency Activities

- Working to set detention standards with counties who will be operating detention centers following passage of SB 2112.
- Implementing proviso to close state residential facilities; Dozier is now closed, Desoto will close by mid-August.
- Developing new guidelines for the new civil citation legislation, including data entry in JJIS prevention.
- Revising model for community control, with an improvement plan and implementation schedule out soon.

Agency Legislative Priorities for Upcoming Session

- Reform Bill/ Blueprint Bill- (Snyder/Evans)
- Detention Bill (New priority this year)
- Human Trafficking (New priority this year)
- Juvenile Justice Education (New priority this year)

Other DJJ areas of focus

- For the funds shifted to front end, (\$5.1 mil) DJJ is considering "fee for service" in communities based on needs instead of ITN or RFP.
- DJJ participating in Georgetown University Juvenile Justice System Improvement Project (JJSIP) in Pinellas - initiative will help to inform community based care delivery. Operation PAR is part of team.
- Procurement is a priority for department now, with plans for more use of ITN in future.
- Greater focus on data driven decision making, DJJ staffing up that department.

FJJA 2011-2012 Legislative Agenda

NO CUTS TO JUVENILE JUSTICE

Maintaining funding will:

- Reduce crime, victimization and other related costs;
- Reduce the flow of youth into adult corrections and need for future prison construction.

INCREASE INVESTMENT IN COMMUNITY BASED SERVICES

Increase funding for:

- Prevention, early intervention and diversion programs;
- Community based residential services;
- Transition, reentry and aftercare services;
- Education, vocational training and job placement.

Investing in Florida's Juvenile Justice System Ensures Public Safety

Key Points:

- Last year, DJJ received the largest funding cut in public safety.
- Very few resources have been earmarked for reinvestment into community based services.
- Of the \$77 million cut, only \$5 million will be reinvested.

FJJA 2011-2012 Key Messages

Florida's juvenile justice system is one of the most comprehensive in the nation.

- We have nationally recognized programs and services which serve the needs of local communities.
- Florida is a leader in prevention, early intervention and diversion services which are reducing the number of youth entering the system.

A responsive and balanced juvenile justice continuum is good for Florida and good for the youth who need services.

- Public safety is the most important goal, and a variety of services ensure the right service for the right youth at the right time.
- Investing in the juvenile justice system pays off now in cost savings and in the future in cost avoidance.

Building on what works saves dollars that won't be spent on prisons and will prevent future victims of crime.

- Indicators show us that today's adult prisoners are less likely to be in prison had they benefited from effective juvenile justice interventions at an early age.
